Workshops

In general

On the Thursday afternoon, two rounds are planned, with 6 workshops each. In view of the number of people attending the conference, we assume a maximum of 16 participants per workshop.

At the reception desk in Cometa you will find lists for the workshops on which you can fill in your name. The request is, if you are with a group, to divide as well as possible about the groups the workshops so that the learning effect is as great as possible.

Aim

In addition to giving information and providing insight into the experiences that have been gained, it is important to discover with each other which themes are important for CHAIN5 as a community of practice for level 5 qualifications. They can be themes that can be specifically addressed by those who are involved in the daily practice of designing and offering such qualifications within institutions and organizations. This involves the involvement of teachers, trainers, students, coordinators and other experts involved in level 5.

But there are also themes that explicitly play a role at the level of the institutions as a whole, for example when it comes to the positioning of the level 5 providers - both nationally and internationally. Sharing experiences across national borders can improve the role of an institution within the national system, or lead to other forms of offering level 5 programmes.

Finally, we can also see which themes can be named when it comes to cooperation between national (and regional) networks for level 5 providers and their stakeholders. This can focus on changes at the international level, usable in a country, and subsequently also by institutions.

It can concern matters that play a part in the ability to do projects, the exchange of students, teachers and trainers and the coordination of the national systems with each other in order to have a clear understanding of what cooperation is possible.

During the workshops on Thursday, we will discuss themes from the perspective of various countries. That can make it clear which issues for CHAIN5 are possible to deal with, having after the conference a number of thematic working groups.

It is therefore up to the participants to consider whether these issues also play a role in their own institution, in their national network or in an international context.

On Friday, the outcomes of the workshops will be analyzed in this way. The participants can come up with proposals for themes and to follow developments around level 5.

Thematic groups will then be set up for this, and those interested in joining such a group can exchange ideas with the CHAIN5 Board after the formal closing session on Friday.

The above therefore gives the main features of the interactive nature of the conference. Your input is of great importance in order to gain insight into the themes for CHAIN5.

Below we give the current status of the workshop, with information about the subject that will be discussed. In the newsletter from the beginning of March there will be another update to facilitate the choice of your side as well as possible.

Pathways, a road to student success?

The Pathways Model* is an integrated, institution-wide approach to student success based on intentionally designed, clear, coherent and structured educational experiences, informed by available evidence, that guide each student effectively and efficiently from her/his point of entry through to attainment of high-quality postsecondary credentials and careers with value in the labor market. Central to the pathways model are clear, educationally coherent program maps - which include specific course sequences, progress milestones, and program learning outcomes - that are aligned to what will be expected of students upon program completion in the workforce and in education at the next level in a given field.

In this workshop we will discuss about the diversity in the European field and the capacities which are essential for motivating and supporting higher education institutions and systems to undertake the broadscale institutional reforms involved in implementing guided pathways effectively and at scale. We also look into four dimensions of the Pathways Model, together with essential practices under each.

Internationalization at level 5

We define and redefine what internationalization is or could be.

Many of us believe that internationalization should be integrated in all parts of the curriculum and feel that our students should experience and be aware of how people in other parts of the world live, work and do business. To actually connect and interact with people from other cultures or counties can have big impact on students. Level 5 providers more and more seem to feel they can play an important role in fostering an environment in which students learn to adopt a more international outlook and develop a sense of awareness. And there already are great initiatives like adding international components to existing courses or even offering some of our students the opportunity to do all or parts of their programs abroad. For NHL Stenden students in Level 5 (Associate degree students) these initiatives are not always as available or accessible for level 5 students as we would like them to be. NHL Stenden has started a design process to develop opportunities for Associate degree (level 5) students specifically focused on their context, needs and possible benefits.

In this workshop a possible outline is presented for internationalization opportunities in level 5 programs, and we can start to explore how co-operation between level 5 providers might support the process of opening up internationalization for level 5 students.

INNOVATION HUB ComoNExT OF LOMAZZO

ComoNExT is an Innovation Hub located within a former Lomazzo (CO) cotton mill, founded to foster the competitive development of our country and to promote the culture of innovation. This is a reality that today counts more than 120 companies and startups operating in different fields, which are distinguished by the innovative nature of their businesses.

ComoNExT offers services in consulting and acceleration of ideas which are globally competitive, provides support for new ideas and development of innovative projects, supports in the launching of new entrepreneurial initiatives, collaborates with companies and the world of research, finance, internationalization and business development.

Thanks to the collaboration of all the subjects present at the local and national level (companies, institutions, public and private financiers, universities and research institutes) and the creation of a concrete model of open innovation called NExT Innovation[®], the Innovation Hub will achieve the goal of becoming a continuous source of digital and technology transfer to external businesses, transforming the territory into a brain valley capable of creating value.

Implementing NExT Innovation® in a context of innovation and content such as the one of ComoNExT is based on the idea and implementation of a new collaborative model called the "Daisy Model", involving all the economic actors in the area: businesses, institutions (Chamber of Commerce, trade associations, etc.), universities (Fondazione Politecnico di Milano, Uninsubria, LIUC Università Carlo Cattaneo, Università Cattolica, etc.), the world of capital (bank foundations, venture capital, business angels, etc.) and obviously the Park itself, along with its incubated and established companies.

The "Daisy Model" envisages the activation of "variable-setting" enterprise networks, made up of internal resources of the Innovation Hub, recruited from time to time based on the skills needed to meet the needs of the digital transformation coming from business ventures with an increasingly impacting business revolution.
